

Who owns Kazakhstan's electricity grid?

Kazakhstan's national grid is operated by Kazakhstan's Electricity Grid Operating Company (KEGOC), a state-owned company responsible for electricity transmission and distribution network management. Several medium and small regional electricity companies handle distribution, some privately owned.

How much electricity is generated in Kazakhstan?

In total, in 2021, 114.3 billion kWh of electricity was generated at the country's power plants. Kazakhstan's national grid is operated by Kazakhstan's Electricity Grid Operating Company (KEGOC), a state-owned company responsible for electricity transmission and distribution network management.

KEGOC is the System Operator of the Unified Power System of Kazakhstan, and it owns and manages the assets of the national power grid (NPG). The company operates as the natural monopoly. It owns about 27,000 km of 220-1150 kV electricity transmission lines and 82 electrical substations with more 38.99 GVA of installed transformer capacity.

Moreover, Kazakhstan's energy infrastructure is old. At the end of 2021, the depreciation of electricity, gas, steam, and hot water facilities was at a dangerous 72 percent. In November 2022, an accident at the Ekibastuz TPP power plant left tens of thousands of residents without central heating in 30-degree frost.

Nevertheless, the issue of grid integration already looms large. One reason for this is the lack of balancing capacity in Kazakhstan's power sector, which is dominated by inflexible coal-fired power plants. In this respect, Kazakhstan differs from its neighbour Uzbekistan, where the share of flexible natural gas generation stands at 74 per cent.
